### MR RUPERT ARKELL THOSE AND ADDRESS OF THE DES OF T

The sad death at the age of 59 of Mr Arkell may have been a little softened by the fact that he had lain so very seriously ill after a major stroke. By his very nature, and with his zest for life, Rupert would have found it so difficult and frustrating to have had nothing but to have been an invalid for years.

He had served with obvious esteem, respect and affection with the Wilthsire Yeomanry and in later years as a magistrate both at Faringdon and further afield. He was a well-known and loved member of the farming fraternity, locally and far beyond. To give some idea of his kindness, which not everybody would know, he took upon himself the arduous task of visiting men who were in prison.

Bourton Church was crowded for the Service of Thanksgiving, and fortunately microphones had been installed inside with loudspeakers outside, so almost as many again were bale to participate fully in the Service.

We thank God for Mr Arkell's life, and we remember Mrs Susie Arkell and their daughters Harriet and Kate very much in our prayers now and in the future, that by their faith they may be sustained.

### MRS MURIEL RUTH (POLLY) LAWRENCE

Shrivenham's large Church was almost filled for the funeral of Mrs Lawrence - one of the village's true natives and older members - which went to show the love, esteem and respect that she was held. One of a large family herself (her father having been killed on the rialway line when she was very young) she was a lovely and lovable person.

She took an cative place in nearly every part of village life - a 'real villager' - being a member of W.I., the Royal British Legion, the M.U., the former Over-Sixties, a regular and active member of St Andrew's congregation, and the Women's Fellowship. A marvellous mother, grandmother, sister (and in-law) and aunt - but also very loving and caring for others as well. She was a sort of spokesman for some, say at the almshouoses, and her serious concern was interspersed with her own unique brand of humour.

We thank God for her life, pray for those who mourn, and may she rest in peace.

### MRS NELLIE TUCKER

If not the oldest, nearly the oldest, inhabitant of Shrivenham, Mrs Tucker was loved and held in great esteem. She had been widowed very, very early in her married life, and had a degree of acceptance which was remarkable. She had been a founder member of some organisations like the W.I. and the R.B. Legion, and was always busy - almost to the last knitting for other people and causes.

### THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The clocks have been put back - the darkness falls earlier - but the mornings are lighter earlier. Until now we have tried, and rightly so, to enjoy every bit of sun to make up for the summer we didn't seem to have, but with the latered clocks we feel winter has arrived. November seems to be full of remembrance: and with it, inevitably, memories, and in particular of those we have loved - but not lost. November 1st, All Saints Day, November 2nd, Commemoration of All Souls (transferred, with the 2nd a Sunday; to Monday 3rd), and then November 9th, Remembrance Sunday. How could we, with such a concentration on remembrance, fail to remember all those who have passed from the earthly scene. However, this does not imply much thought just at such times and not others. And whilst there is inevitable sorrow (we would not be human if not affected that way) - the Christian hope speaks both to our condition and to those we have loved. 'We seem to give them back to Thee, 0 God who gavest them to us. Yet, as Thou didst do not lose them in giving, so do we not lose them by their return. Not as the world giveth, givest Thou O Love' of Souls. What Thou givest, Thou takest not away, for what is thine is ours always if we are Thine'.

Having been here quite a long time by present day standards of Ministry, I have shared with so many of you over the years your sorrow; if a Priest loves his people he cannot help but bear in his heart others' pains: he shares them and they all become a part of one. One does not forget - but one does remember. That is how it should be; and we should not be silent - but speak their names. We may know many people still living (some more than others), but I sometimes think that number is exceeded by those who have died. But because the line between the two is precariously thin (as many know), I feel an overwhelming sense of their reality and presence of so many I have had the privelege to know and love. They have taught me a graet deal by their lives, their love and their



courage and their attitude towards the great adventure that lies ahead for us all. As one writer has put it 'Why should I be out of mind, if I am out of sight! I am but waiting for you, for an interval, somewhere very near, just around the corner ..... All is well .....

Come as they may - winter and those early dark evenings, but as the mornings brighten, time passes - and quickly. It is always later than you think. If some lived to be a hundred they would still not be ready to die and would be shamed by others who hadn't half that time.

Soon Advent will be here. It speaks to us of Christ's comings: yes - plural! As surely as He was born into this world to save us, celebrated at Christmas, He has promised to come again. When, nobody knows - except God alone. So we are told to be ready whenever it may be. And, if He doesn't come in our lifetime, we still pass from here - and Advent is a time of preparation - and Hope - just as all our lives should be. Sadly in some ways because of our commercialisation, consumer oriented and greedy society, Christmas has been turned into a time of grasping, and over indulgence. Rather I would turn your thoughts ti the fact that love cannot be measured by spoiling children and ourselves ('I can't understand it - we have always given him/her everything he/she ever wanted') that is the trouble. Love IS - that God gave us His Son and in Him, to htose who believe - He GIVES what the world cannot give - and that is eternal life.






