SHRIVENHAM.

HRIVENHAM, which has a station on the G.W.R., includes the township of Watchfield and tithing of Beckett, and is 5½ miles from Faringdon and 6½ from Swindon. It is in the Northern Division of Berks, Union, Petty Sessional Division and County Court District of Faringdon, and Diocese of Oxford. The register of the Church of St. Mary Magdalen dates from 1640; and the living, a vicarage of the net value of £180, with residence, is held by the Rev. Edward Frank Hill, M.A. There is a Wesleyan Chapel. Viscount Barrington is Lord of the Manor, and, with Mr. A. W. Fairthorne, the principal landowner. Beckett House, the seat of his lordship, is a beautiful specimen of the Elizabethan style of architecture, situated in extensive and picturesque grounds. Area, 2,675 acres; rateable value, £8,359; population in 1901, 633. Letters are despatched at 9.45 a.m. and 9.45 p.m. week-days, and 9.45 p.m. Sundays.

WATCHFILLD

Is a township 2 miles from Shrivenham Station (G.W.R.), 3½ from Highworth, and 4½ from Faringdon, in the Northern Division of Berks, Union, Petty Sessional Division and County Court District of Faringdon, and Diocese of Oxford. The Church of St. Thomas was erected in 1858, and the living is a chapelry annexed to Shrivenham, of the joint net yearly value of £148, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev. Edward Frank Hill, M.A. The Rev. C. A. Brereton, M.A., is curate at Watchfield. There is a Primitive Methodist Chapel. Viscount Barrington and the Hon. D. P. Bouverie are Lords of the Manor and principal landowners. Area, 1,517 acres; rateable value, £1,880; population in 1901, 318. Letters arrive through Shrivenham, R.S.O., and the Post Box is cleared at 7.30 p.m., and on Bank Holidays at 12 noon. There is an Infants' School, of which Miss Shepherd is the mistress.
