Report

Copy of H. M. Inspector's Report (1900-1901)
Vised School. "The children are in good order. They have received careful instruction and have made commendable progress during the year.

The school premises are in an unsatisfactory condition. The roof, beams, walls and window frames in both rooms should, at the earliest possible opportunity, be thoroughly cleaned, and either disinfected or otherwise suitably treated. The cleaning of the school should, in the future, be more regular and more thorough.

Infant class. 'The infants are being taught with great care and kindness and are making good progress.' A iron fire guard should be provided for the stove in the infant room.'

The Board of Education will expect to be informed as to the cleaning of the school. Attention was called last year to the filthy condition of the roof of the infant room; but this had not been attended to when H. M. Inspector

6. e. 1901. visited the school, and the offices were also in an unsatisfactory condition having regard to the recent outbreak of diphtheria. the Board will require a Certificate from the Medical Officer of Health that the school has been thoroughly disinfected and cleaned and that the offices are in a proper condition and they will also require an assurance from the School Board that the latter will be flushed every day. Otherwise they may find it necessary to withhold the Grant under Article 85(a) of the Code.

This matter is so serious that I contend these managers should give an expression & opinion as, in the charge is involved an insinuation of the laxity & moral duty; and, also, that the matter should be brought to the notice of the County Authority. Whenever possible, school hours & out of school hours, outside arrangements with respect to the children have always received careful attention.
