

Monday Jan. 17th. 1881

I. Hugh Gould Webb took charge of and opened the Marlborough School Board School this morning, and had an attendance of 60 children.

Tues. Jan. 24th.

On account of the severity of the weather the School was closed on Wed. Thurs & Friday. Very little work was done on the two days. The School was opened. An inventory of furniture & materials was taken & entered into the Stores Book.

The children necessarily are very backward, and only two can do any arithmetic at all. The others cannot do even addition or notation.

On account of family affliction I was obliged to be absent from School on Mon. Tues. & Wed. The School was conducted by Mrs Webb, with the help of Miss King.

Miss. Beresford, commenced duties on. Wednesday.

The Attendance has again been small.

Feb 11.

The average for the past week is 62.2. and the number on the books 94, an increase of five. The av. would have been more, had it not been for a very wet & stormy day on Wednesday; Many of the children went home in the afternoon.

Mr. Gilbert Bracore, a Member of the Board visited the School on Wednesday.

The Average for the past week is 571.6 very fair for the nos on books. viz 86.

The children admitted during the week were twelve ~~thirteen~~, one boy & two girls. on Tuesday, and the others, 14 boys, 15 girls on Monday. The Rev. — Warren, and his daughter, visited the School on Tuesday afternoon and expressed themselves, as being very pleased with the order of the School. Miss Warren heard the older children read.

The children are gradually being placed in their proper classes.

Feb. 21st.

The average for past week was 75.1 and the number on Books 96, an increase of ten.
Mr. Deacon visited the School on Wednesday.
The School was conducted by Mr. Webb and Miss Buresford on Friday Tuesday afternoon, myself having gone to Loddington to get the Time Table signed by H.M.I. and to make sundry enquiries. The S.T. was not approved, as it was not sufficiently large.

Miss Buresford was absent from school the whole of Monday last.

Several children were sent home on account of a dispute as to the amt. of School fees; the parents refusing to pay the fee as directed by the Board.

March 9.

According to the "Terms of Agreement," on Wednesday, March 2^d being Ash Wednesday, the School was closed, the premises being, for that day, not in the hands of the Board.

The number of children admitted this week being 4 Boys 13 Girls.

The whole of the children were rearranged into their proper classes & standards during the week.

Several children were again sent home on account of not bringing sufficient money for Sch.-Fees. notably. Mary Reeves & the Burtons.

At the Board Meeting on Monday Evening the Question of the disputed School Fees was discussed, and it was resolved the Annie Lelious money should be that of the 3rd Class, ~~the~~ ^{as} 2nd Class, the rest as at first proposed

The School Fees for the following Children were remitted by the Board for one week.
viz:- James Nash, John North, Mary Reeves and Annie Elamor.

It was also arranged the no extra subject should be attempted at present, & the Clerk was ordered to send for Books, Stationery, &c. as per list.

The Children, whose parents despatch the School fees are still away. Mary Reeves again brought 2^o instead of 4^o. & was again sent home for more money.

The attendance is improving, but the instruction is still impeded by the want of Materials, which have been ordered for some time, but have not arrived.

The Reading is improved with regard to emphasis, tho' still poor; the Writing still bad, but art has advanced more quickly & correctly.

The others paid this week. The amount of School Fees brought too little last week Henry Lee & H. Johnson did not pay their full amount. also S. Reddy, again brought the lower rate.

On Wednesday Ernest and Charles Brunsden with others were kept in to write their dictation out, while my back was turned Charles went off, and did not attend school in the afternoon.

He and Jesse Bashe went home.

The next morning these two had four stripes with the cane on the hand, and

at 11 o'clock both these boys, together with the brother Ernest Brinsford, ran away from School.

On Tuesday the Schools were visited by the Rev. P. P. Warren and his family. The Absent Sheets (37) were sent over on Friday, together with the School-Recs Arrears Recd. the former having been omitted the week previous for want of time to write them.

As for the teachers, I have already been suffering, partly, I believe, from this cause. There will be a Board Meeting this evening and the Board will again be asked to see to this matter.

The furnishing of the Infant room, and some more desks for the Mixed room will also again be asked for.

Punishment. Edward Goddard was punished on Friday afternoon by four strokes on the hands for throwing a large stone at another boy. As it happens no harm was done, but it might have been very serious.
